A NOTE FROM RABBI VALERIE

Shabbat is a day of rest, of mental scrutiny and of balance. Without it, the workdays are insipid. (Chaim Nachman Bialik)

The time to study a little Torah, or to pray, or to meditate, can't be "when everything else is done" - because everything else is never done. (Rabbi Rachel Barenblat)

Shabbat is the most important holiday – holy day – in Judaism. More times than I can count, I have said that if everyone in the world kept some kind of Sabbath, we would be a kinder world with much more peace. If everyone took 24 or 25 hours where we did nothing but be present with ourselves, with family and friends, with that which is Divine and Holy in the created world and beyond; if we took time to firmly place our feet on the earth and reach for the heavens at the same time in balance; reflected on our week and put our life in perspective; played and healed... or if we just stopped and were still, then the peace that we would inevitably find inside ourselves would connect all humanity.

Do I exaggerate? Imagine it: a weekly taste of the Messianic World, a time when all is right with every single person. A fully observed Shabbat worldwide, regardless of the day on which it was observed, would infuse the rest of the week with holiness.

We can start with ourselves and our families. Judaism is rich with rituals that help us observe Shabbat. Sometimes we need a prompt to get us started. I've suggested a few above, although they're more goals than concrete activities.

One of those goals is gathering with family and friends. We all know about our beautiful Shabbat gatherings on Friday nights, better known as Shabbat Services and Oneg. We may not know that we have a couple of Shabbat gatherings on Saturday morning. In addition to Torah Study, I would like to focus on a very special gathering, and present an invitation:

On Saturday mornings, our congregational children gather for joyful prayer through music. This Shabbat morning T'filah is led by Gitit and our song leaders, includes an interactive Torah Reading, Mi Shebeirach and Mourner's Kaddish among other prayers. We sing through most of the service, tunes you may be familiar with from Friday night.

There is nothing more joyful and praiseworthy than experiencing worship with our children. Our children are the doorway to seeing the Divine and Holy in the created world, and their inspired wisdom keeps our feet firmly planted on the ground at the same time as guiding us to reach for the heavens. Mornings may be my worst time of day, but Shabbat Morning Services with our children are filled with moments that are the best times of my week.

These services are meant to be our congregational service, so no invitation is really needed. I'm inviting you anyway; sometimes we need an invitation: Please join us for Shabbat Services, Saturday mornings (when Religious School is in session – check the calendar), 9:00 am in the JCC Auditorium. As you enter, just tell the desk attendant that you're from Temple Emanuel Sinai.

Shabbat is joy and healing and community and perspective, heaven and earth. Our children, the very source of blessing and life, teach us how to get there.





RELIGIOUS SCHOOL AND YOUTH NEWS

Shalom from the Religious School! Happy secular New Year to you and your family! I hope you and your family had a nice holiday season! Before the break, our students were very busy working on Hebrew language, Jewish values, holiday, ewish values, holiday, and Torah. Here is some information from our teachers!

Grades K-1

We are learning the Hebrew letters and the Torah stories. We celebrate the Jewish Holidays through art projects, songs, and yummy food.

Grade 2

We are learning the Hebrew letters, reviewing each week's Torah portion, working on kindness and respect for others and trying to build a stronger community. We are achieving this with crafts, workbooks, and class discussions.

Grade 3

We are working on learning about the Torah portions. The last one we worked on was where Isaac was almost sacrificed. The kids in this class really enjoy crafts so for this portion we drew little goats and fire and put them in a cup to symbolize the sacrifice. We are learning Hebrew up to level 4 and are learning the importance of G-d and respect.

Grades 4-5

We are doing a lot of Hebrew writing and reading. We are also working on Hebrew letters and vowels. Our class does a lot of different movement activities incorporating the Aleph-Bet. We are currently getting prepared for our Friday night service with the sixth and seventh grades. All and all we are strengthening our bond as a class.

Grades 6-7

We are trying to determine if becoming a Bar/Bat Mitzvah is for just a day or for a lifetime. We are exploring the difference between charity and tzedakah. Our students are spearheading the fundraiser Coats for Kids. We are looking for donors of all ages to donate their coats for kids who need them. We are working on interpreting the prayers for the reasons of understanding the themes, overarching meanings, and why we say the prayers.

The teachers and I are looking forward to continuing to learn and grow together in the upcoming months!

Tu B'Shevat, the 15th of Shevat on the Jewish calendar, celebrated on Sunday, February 5th with TES's Tu B'Shevat program being held on Monday, February 6th. This is the day that marks the beginning of a "new year" for trees. This is the season in which the earliest-blooming trees in the Land of Israel emerge from their winter sleep and begin a new fruit-bearing cycle. We mark the day of Tu B'Shevat by eating fruit, particularly from the kinds that are singled out by the Torah in its praise of the bounty of the Holy Land: grapes, figs, pomegranates, olives and dates. On this day we remember that "man is a tree of the field" (Deuteronomy 20:19), and reflect on the lessons we can derive from our botanical analogue. Our students will learn about the meaning of this important holiday by participating in various activities and lessons, as well as creating their own poems and short skits.






