



A NOTE FROM RABBI VALERIE

"Change is the law of life, and those who look only to the past or the present are certain to miss the future." (John Fitzgerald Kennedy)

"The mind has exactly the same power as the hands; not merely to grasp the world, but to change it." (Colin Wilson)

"Change is as inexorable as time, yet nothing meets with more resistance." (Benjamin Disraeli)

I wish I could have found some fabulous quote in the Bible or the Talmud about the need for change or the eternality of change, but as Benjamin Disraeli said, "nothing meets with more resistance."

Judaism and the Jewish Community is striking in both its rejection of change and ability to transform in order to persevere. We are told that that we cannot add or take away anything from the Torah, yet our ancient rabbis, with progressive imagination, manipulated the text to serve the community of their time. Their foresight and creativity fashioned a Judaism which Jews could reasonably follow even in a challenging world ruled by others. And always, the rabbis managed to ground their rulings in our sacred text, the same text that even they insisted did not change.

This is just one example of how Jews and Judaism reject the notion of change while in the midst of changing ourselves. In 2023, religious affiliation and observance is changing across all faith traditions. We might be tempted to say that the pandemic was the cause, but it was more likely that the pandemic, our isolation, and the greater use of technology only quickened the pace of what was already happening. The way that Jews are Jewish is changing and will look very different for our grandchildren. There's a chance we may barely recognize what they will one day call a Jewish home, or Jewish practice, or even Jewish identity.

It can be a little scary (if you believe me), and it can be exciting and empowering. In our discussions over our selected Judaism Unbound podcasts during our "Not Your Rabbis' Judaism" sessions, we have talked about this issue again and again. What does being Jewish look like today? What will it look like in the near future? And what is our role, as individuals and as a community, in being part of that change?

We're not quite at the tipping point of a major change yet, but we're close. We can either choose to hold on tight to the basis of what Judaism has been for the past 1500 years, or we can widen our boundaries, walk outside the doors of our synagogues, and open our arms to welcome a diversity of Jews and Jewish expressions. Let's learn, explore, and change ourselves so we can be ready to embrace this new time in the life of our people.

CHANGING

Change is inevitable. Some for good and some otherwise. It's always happening no matter how subtle or obvious. I think the last couple of years have certainly proven this. Of course, there are those obvious things like changing clothes, or hairstyles, or cars, or maybe even places to live. It's the time of year when our Board of Directors shifts and changes. We will also see a new Executive Committee. Our Leadership and Nominating Committee is working very hard on this shift. The one thing in this process that I sincerely hope will NOT change is that our wonderful congregation will continue to support and uplift our Board as it has in the past. It's so important that this never changes. It's the thing that allows us to move forward and change for better and not otherwise.

May you all enjoy this upcoming summer whatever you do! It's an absolute pleasure for my family and me to be a part of this community and the changes that take place.

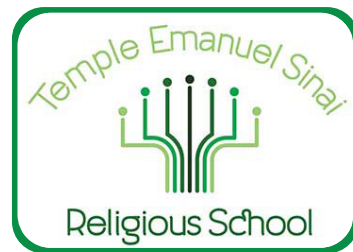

As we approach the end of another successful year at Temple Emanuel Sinai Religious School, I wanted to take a moment to share some of the highlights and achievements from the past year. It has been an incredible journey of growth, learning, and community building for our students, teachers, and families.



HIGHLIGHTS OF THE YEAR:

Expanded Curriculum

FUTURING: A REAL WORD FOR A REAL ADVENTURE

Yes, futuring is a real word and here is a definition: "Futuring is the field of using a systematic process for thinking about, picturing possible outcomes, and planning for the future". The Board of Directors of Temple Emanuel Sinai (TES) formed a new committee this year with the express goal of reimagining our institutional purpose and structure in order to transform our congregation into one that people both want and need. It was named the Futuring Committee.

This committee was created to look at new ways to attract and retain members; and, more importantly, to help our existing Temple members feel more engaged. This committee is working to help ensure a bright future for TES, and to provide more of what people are looking for and what they will find interesting and engaging.

We intend to engage a consultant with relevant experience to help steer us through this process. Currently, we are obtaining information from various consultants to gauge their suitability and fit for our process. Many of these candidates were suggested by the Union of Reform Judaism (URJ) and have completed similar projects for other Reform congregations nationwide.

This committee is co-chaired by Meg Hoey and Karen Kagan and includes many hard working, volunteers. Thanks to everyone working on this committee and helping steer the future direction of TES.
