A NOTE FROM RABBI VALERIE

I grew up in the 70's and 80's and was pretty oblivious to antisemitism. I was born in Cleveland, in an area which was so diverse that the Orthodox Jews in my neighborhood seemed more foreign to me than the black and brown kids I played with. When I moved to Jacksonville, Florida in the late 70's, I had a rude awakening about racism, but I was still pretty sheltered when it came to antisemitism. In High School, now in Merritt Island,

Florida, with a very small Jewish population, there were one or two incidents that were handled quickly and appropriately. And my teenage and early college years were filled with the repudiation of the term "Jewish American Princess."

Most of my adult life outside of rabbinical school – and now living in Worcester – has been spent in small Southern towns. Obviously, I knew antisemitism existed and was growing, but it rarely touched me. One could debate whether the desire for fundamentalist Christians to convert Jews was "religious antisemitism." I experienced that a lot, but usually it didn't feel like it came from a place of hate or rejection; rather, it came from a place of love and concern, albeit misguided.

Everything changed in 2016. I don't believe that the number of people with antisemitic attitudes increased, but the number of active incidents increased. It seemed to me that people had been given permission to spew their hatred, that it had now become acceptable in certain arenas.

Everything changed again after October 7. I have no statistics or scholarship to prove what I'm about to assert, just experiential evidence. Now, unlike in 2016, it feels as if the increase in antisemitism is both in attitude and incidents. Around the country, we're seeing it play out on college campuses, we're feeling it in conversations with colleagues, some people who have engaged in social justice work for years are no longer welcomed in DEI spaces, and much more.

A congregant said to me recently that we had been experiencing a golden age for Jews when it came to com-munal acceptance and the superficial lack of antisemitism. Perhaps my generation and younger had never re-ally known what it felt like to be "others" as Jews. That, too, is changing. Obviously, not everyone in our world is antisemitic. We can never discount the number of people who reject this attitude and judge a person based on that person's heart, mind, soul, and actions.

It's still scary. What can we do? Vote. Show up. Speak up. Be visible – as Jews. Most of all, we have to support each other. Throughout the millennia that we have existed, the Jewish community looks to me like a dysfunc-tional family. We care about each other, but we still have divisions and arguments and sometimes even intoler-ance. It's time we gather together and support each other even more. I'm not suggesting we compromise our values, but rise above the differences instead.

"Kol Yisrael aravim zeh bazeh – Every Jew is responsible for one another." (Talmud)

With successful music programs this year at Chanukah and Rabbi Valerie's 25/10 year anniversary, we look forward to utilizing Gitit Shoval's skills and abundant musical contacts to produce more programs during the year. She is actively recruiting enthusiastic volunteers to her chorus to enhance offerings through the year as well. The worship committee has been able to develop meaningful programs this year, with gratitude and healing services which have brought individuals into contact with our congregation, and we anticipate bringing in speakers for topical educational programs of interest to us through the work of the Lifelong Learning committee. Other committees have remained committed to synagogue life as well, with lower profile activities. The TES eNews is the relevant source for information, and we look forward to refining our methods to distribute information to our members and to the community at large. Just as the paper publicity world transitioned to a digital world, the digital world is evolving at a more rapid pace, and we look to compete and flourish in that space going forward.

What a great year we have had at the Religious School! We are excited to share some of these accomplishments and look forward to the opportunities that the next academic year will bring.

Hebrew Language - Our students have made remarkable strides in their Hebrew language skills. From mastering the Aleph-Bet in the lower grades, to reading Hebrew prayers, our structured curriculum has fostered a deep connection with the language of our ancestors.

Holidays - Celebrating Jewish holidays together has been a cornerstone of our school year, providing students with a hands-on understanding of our traditions. SOCIAL ACTION

A big THANK YOU from the Walk for the Homeless and the Social Action Committee!

Our Temple Emanuel Sinai team met its ambitious goal of \$1800 for this year's 39th Walk for the Homeless and received an enthusiastic thank you at the end of May, saying, "Your donations help more families stay in their homes." Our Social Action Committee, who fielded our team, sends a big thank you to all who donated and walked; the TES team received support from both inside and outside our congregation. Overall, while the Walk did not meet its \$90,000 goal, it raised over \$69,500 from thousands of individuals and companies. This year's Walk funded some of Central Mass Housing Alliance's core programs, keeping people at risk for homelessness informed of their rights, helping individuals and families to maintain or return to stable housing, and providing some direct service to families and individuals who have become homeless. Walk day, May 19, was a beautiful day and the



enthusiasm of the crowd was palpable. Our small but mighty walking team carried our sign saying "Praying with our legs!" joining thousands of other supporters in making a difference here in Worcester.

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






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


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
