



A NOTE FROM RABBI VALERIE

Although I'm writing this on Tu B'Shvat, you are reading it a few weeks afterward. Even so, we don't need to be limited to one day to celebrate and learn from trees. Studying with a colleague last night, we encountered this poem, and it spoke to me: a timely message for my internal conflict about our world.

The Sycamore by Wendell Berry

In the place that is my own place, whose earth
I am shaped in and must bear, there is an old tree growing,
a great sycamore that is a wondrous healer of itself.
Fences have been tied to it, nails driven into it,
hacks and whittles cut in it, the lightning has burned it.
There is no year it has flourished in that has not harmed it.
There is a hollow in it
that is its death, though its living brims whitely
at the lip of the darkness and flows outward.
Over all its scars has come the seamless white
of the bark. It bears the gnarls of its history
healed over. It has risen to a strange perfection
in the warp and bending of its long growth.
It has gathered all accidents into its purpose.
It has become the intention and radiance of its dark fate.
It is a fact, sublime, mystical and unassailable.
In all the country there is no other like it.
I recognize in it a principle, an indwelling
the same as itself, and greater, that I would be ruled by.
I see that it stands in its place and feeds upon it,
and is fed upon, and is native, and maker.



This poem contains so many images, images that evoke emotions and can be universally symbolic. In a grand scale, I hear of trauma and victory, both making their indelible, permanent and physical mark on this tree – God's creation; yet the tree endures. Its longevity is a sign of its victory, along with the grief and joy, healing and growth experienced throughout a lifetime.

The lesson of this Sycamore is staying in for the "long game." At times, I feel paralyzed and overwhelmed by how much attention our society needs, how much tikkun – "fixing" is required. I know I am not the only one, as I have spoken to many people who are speechless with fear and anxiety about "what next?" As I poke my head out of the sand, out of denial, I know that my only reasonable path is to choose one issue that I'm passionate about and focus my energy and action there. Furthermore, to take that one issue and narrow it even more; then find a partner and perhaps an organization with infrastructure and get to work. If everyone targets their attention in this way, then someone somewhere will be addressing the problems of our society with singular intensity.

One last comment, indirectly related but too good of a teaching to let pass us buy. A member of our community, wise beyond their years, reminded me of the teaching "argument for the sake of heaven." They withdrew from conversations with a group of people because the arguments had turned into a bitter and useless Korach/Moses fight described by the ancient rabbis, a fight in which everyone loses. Instead, they gravitated to the peers who discussed issues in the way of Hillel and Shammai, the goal being "for the sake of heaven": to converse - albeit from different perspectives, with the vision and hope of making the world a better place.



PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

I hope we have passed through the worst of our winter weather. The last two months have seen us celebrate Shabbat Shirah with a service of music on Erev Shabbat on February 7 led by our Cantorial Soloist Gitit Shoval, and a special guest vocalist Yali Irelander, and our singing group, Kol Ha'Lev, for a very well received program. We hosted some students from Assumption University taking their course in World Religion who appreciated our efforts to make them feel welcome, and a longtime member and family, who had experienced the loss of a close family member in the previous few days. The ability to console and express condolences to members of our synagogue family is an opportunity not easily equaled in the online experience. As I have stated on other occasions, we offer a place that is familiar and comfortable to our members when their world is turned asunder. That recognition of the sadness and pain that we offer to them is an extraordinary gift, especially if we have already been on the receiving end of that generosity of caring.

Our Caring Committee continues to contact members of our community as well, with phone calls and written notes, which members report to us with great appreciation. While these expressions of support may seem casual to us, they are received with enormous gratitude, that we have recognized their pain of loss, or the burden of their illness.

In March we are moving the Kabbalat Shabbat service time to 6:30pm with an early pre-service "cocktail hour" minus the cocktails, looking forward to making the time more convenient for our members. We hope we can see more younger families with children in the building for the Friday night service in response to a request from our members.

Purim and Passover are soon upon us, and programs are being planned to enrich the experience for our members of all ages. Additionally, we are starting to plan for our next fiscal year, looking for programs to enhance the life of our congregation.

I would be remiss not to extend enormous thanks to Steve Contois: our building supervisor, precision Oneg Challah slicer, contributor of baked goods for our Onegs, and the myriads of other tasks he has done for us over the last 12 years as he departs Central Mass for the warmer environs of South Carolina. We have been extremely fortunate to have him as part of the staff that makes the building run so smoothly. We are celebrating him on Friday, March 28 and hope that you will attend to express your appreciation to him.

Finally, we are gratified to see the start of the end of conflict in Israel and Gaza, wishing for the safe return of all the hostages, and the hope for beginning a new era in the Mideast.

A bit about myself:

I have a background in birth work, as a midwife, doula, and childbirth educator, during which time I served my Phoenix, AZ community in private practice, as well as through The Arizona Birth Network, a nonprofit I co-founded and co-directed, and through my role as a childbirth and parenting educator, doula, and resident supervisor in a group home for pregnant and mothering teens in the foster care and refugee systems.

In 2024, I began my midlife pivot, and graduated with a BA in psychology from Smith College, where the primary focus of my studies was perfectionism. During my time at Smith, I also had the privilege of studying with renowned journalists, Susan Faludi and Russ Rymer, and fiction author, Ruth Ozeki. I now utilize this background as a Certified Intuitive Eating Counselor and soon-to-be yoga teacher, working with individuals to heal their relationships with food and their bodies, and as an independent journalist and essayist.

When I'm not working, you'll find me by the ocean, in the woods, with my nose in a book, on my yoga mat, or davening at my local synagogue.

I live in Longmeadow, MA with my wife, Jena, and our English bulldog, Chalupa Jane Schwartz, Esq. We have five adult children, ranging in age from 18 to 30. More important than anything else in this introduction, we also have a three-year-old grandson.

I am so excited to get to know all of you as I grow in my role at TES!

An Unlikely Friendship: Helene Freed and Jessa Sinnott

Jessa Sinnott, sixth-year doctoral candidate, Claims Conference Fellow and Hannah and Roman Kent Research Award recipient, met Helene Freed, longtime Strassler Center donor, at her synagogue in the summer of 2023, where Jessa gave a presentation on her dissertation project entitled *Anti-Jewish Pogroms and Neighborhood Violence in Nazi-Occupied Poland: Szczuczyn County*. Helene's father, Samuel was born Szlomo Perler in 1917 in Szczuczyn, one of the main villages featured in Jessa's research. Helene and Jessa began attending Shabbat services together and soon became friends. Helene shared her father's and grandfather's stories about growing up in the shtetl, their apartment above the butcher shop, and their family bakery.

In early 2024, Jessa began planning a research trip to Białystok, located just 50 miles southeast of Szczuczyn. She invited Helene and promised to show her the village where her father was born.

In May 2024, Helene and Jessa traveled to Warsaw, Białystok, and Szczuczyn. Through local contacts, Jessa found the apartment where Helene's father had lived. The building has been renovated and converted into a small Carrefour shop. Through archival documents and testimony from Szczuczyn residents, Jessa was able to put together a tour of the town, including the site of the Jewish cemetery, the Rabbi's home, the Kaplan photography studio, the old Jewish quarter, and the bridge where young couples would often court.

This journey between friends brought Jewish Szczuczyn to life, out of the archives and out of faded memories. For Helene, imagining her father in the town square outside his home and her grandparents meeting on the bridge, visiting the studio where all of her family photos were taken, and finally, visiting the cemetery where generations of her family were buried – and the pain that comes from the neglect of their memory – was a unique experience. For Jessa, visiting Szczuczyn with Helene meant uncovering a new reality beyond the death of the shtetl, Jewish life in Szczuczyn as it flourished before the Holocaust and survived in the families of its descendants – in people like Helene.

PURIM FOOD DRIVE - MARCH 2ND THRU 23RD

Did you know that Purim is the holiday when it is traditional for Jewish communities to hold food drives?

"The same days on which Jews enjoyed relief from their foes and the same month which had been transformed for them from one of grief to joy and from mourning to festival, they were to observe them as days of feasting and merry-making, and as an occasion for gifts to one another and gifts to people in need" (*Esther 9:22*).

In keeping with this commandment, the TES Social Action Committee is asking congregants to make a financial contribution toward our Purim Food Drive. With this money, our partner organization, Rachel's Table, will work with a produce company to purchase fresh fruit and vegetables, which are in short supply, and donate them to local shelters and neighborhood centers.

Increased cost of food, combined with skyrocketing housing expenses in Central MA, have resulted in a crisis of food insecurity, with some families having to make the heartbreaking choice between putting food on the table and heating their homes.

A few relevant facts about this crisis' local impact (provided by Worcester Center for Food Equity):

1 in 12 people in Worcester are food insecure.

18.4% of households in Worcester face food insecurity.

17,290 children in Worcester live in food-insecure households, a substantial portion of those affected.

Over 50% of Massachusetts renters are burdened with unaffordable housing costs.



"Rabbi Alexander Schindler served Temple Emanuel from 1953 to 1959. He was Temple Emanuel's first Assistant Rabbi. During his tenure at Emanuel, he influenced many young people who went on to be leaders of the Temple and the Worcester Jewish Community and Jewish communities throughout the country.

After leaving Emanuel, he became Executive Director of the New England Region of the UAHC (predecessor to URJ) and in 1973 was elected president of the UAHC. He served in that role until 1996. Rabbi Schindler was an outstanding leader of the Reform Movement and of American Jewry. During his years at UAHC, he remained close with his many Worcester friends."
